Recently Bev McNabb told me that learning about the LandBack lunches (2b) inspired a relative to use her writing skills to call on the leadership of the Hamilton Spectator to offer more comprehensive reporting of events involving First Nations (letter attached).

It's a good question to think about: what can we bring to the <u>Calls to Action</u> and the events going on around us? I have heard more than one speaker encourage us to find one of the Calls to Action that we relate to and work in our sphere of influence to help bring that change about. A thought for a personal resolution as 2022 draws closer!
