 - a. Unsettling the Settler Within, by Paulette Regan, who served as Director of Research for the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. Book description: In a thorough, well-researched and compelling manner, Regan documents Canadian myths about peacemaking settler superiority, myths that were constructed by the distortion and obliteration of Indigenous contributions, strengths and gifts. She invites settlers to undertake their own "unsettling" to gain a more truthful, just understanding of Canada's history and present structural racism/ injustice.
